

# ROADRUNNER RAMBLINGS

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## **Las Cruces CBC Summary**

I would like to again thank all of you who participated in this year's Las Cruces CBC. In spite of the nasty weather (snow, fog, rain, and bitter cold wind), we still managed to have a successful Christmas Bird Count on Dec. 21, 2013.

We had a total of 49 participants this year which is up from 43 on last year's count. The final count of individual birds was 30,739 which is just 616 less than last year. There were 109 species reported - one more than last year.

There were 10 unusual/rare species observed: Northern Bobwhite, Harris's Hawk, Broad-billed Hummingbird, Broad-tailed Hummingbird, Williamson's Sapsucker, Cassin's Vireo, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Black-throated Gray Warbler, Fox Sparrow, and Harris's Sparrow. These species are unusual for our CBC circle, which means that only 1 or 2 have been sighted in the past 38 years.

We had an unusually high number of low counts for the circle this year - 37 out of 109 species. I attribute this to the nasty weather on count day. It appears that birders walked less and drove more, plus the birds stayed hidden more in the bushes and weeds because of the cold wind. We had no sightings of Northern Pintails, Ring-billed Gulls, or White-breasted Nuthatches. Overall, the count of various sparrow species we normally see was down this year. The gross number of sparrows counted this year was 1,575, which is down by 1,048 (almost 40% less) from last year. Of the 1,575 sparrows counted, 885 were White-crowned Sparrows. That is approximately 56% of all the sparrows observed. By contrast, last year's White-crowned Sparrow count was 1,942 which was approximately 74% of the sparrow count for our 2012 CBC. This year's count appeared to have a better distribution of sparrow species observed in the circle.

Finally, the most White-winged Doves and American Crows observed was in the Old Refuge portion of our circle, which is west of Mesilla and south of the Calle del Norte Bridge (basically the Mesilla Valley Bosque State Park area). Mesilla Park had a large count of White-winged Doves also. Our White-winged Dove count for the circle was 11,359 which is up by 3,161 from last year. This count is about average for our circle, and we still hold the perhaps "unenviable" record for most White-winged Doves counted in a CBC for the entire nation.

## **Las Palomas Marsh: Volunteers Needed!**

In order to fulfill our birding responsibility for Las Palomas Marsh, we need to start up again a periodic bird survey/census of the Marsh. Therefore, we need birders to volunteer to conduct a bird survey or census at least once a month at the Marsh. The Marsh is located east of Exit 71 on I-25, and it is a New Mexico birding "hot spot".

More than one survey can be conducted each month, and one person or a group of birders can conduct the survey. The goal is to conduct at least one survey a month, so that we can further populate the database of information for the Marsh. The only stipulation is that you or someone in your birding group enter the data into Cornell University's eBird.org database on-line. I will be developing a pool of birders that are interested in helping out with this worthwhile project. 

### Socorro, NM Birding Hotspots. March 21-23.

A small group of us avid birders are planning a weekend birding trip to Socorro, NM on Friday, March 21 through Sunday, March 23. We plan to leave early Friday afternoon and stop at Las Palomas Marsh for an hour or two of birding on the way north. Saturday will be an interesting birding outing to Water Canyon in the Magdalena Mountains west of Socorro. Travelling through a variety of habitats (from sagebrush flats to higher altitude montane regions) promises glimpses at Montezuma Quail, Juniper Titmouse, Bushtit, Hairy Woodpecker, Acorn Woodpecker, and possibly Red Crossbill and Bridled Titmouse. On Sunday, we will bird a few areas in the Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge just south of Socorro. We are targeting to return to Las Cruces by mid- to late afternoon on Sunday. # *Richard Bischoff Memorial Scholarship*

The MVAS Richard Bischoff Memorial Scholarship was established in 2007 and gave its first \$1000 grant in 2008. Richard joined the board in 2004 and brought many new ideas to the chapter. One of those ideas was the creation of a graduate student scholarship at New Mexico State University. Because of his pivotal role in the scholarship and his many contributions to MVAS, the scholarship is called the Mesilla Valley Audubon's Richard Bischoff Memorial Scholarship.

The scholarship supports graduate student research at New Mexico State University that is consistent with the MVAS mission and promotes natural resource conservation.

Not all recipients study birds. One recipient conducted a study on Banner-tailed Kangaroo Rats to develop a conservation model for the Chihuahuan Desert, while another investigated the life history of the endangered Rio Grande Jumping Mouse. Scholarship recipients have also studied plants, including the history and effects of the encroachment of junipers into riparian habitats in southwestern New Mexico, and the conservation genetics of Rio Grande cottonwoods. Other winners have explored the effect of habitat fragmentation on Burrowing Owl nest productivity and grassland restoration technique's effects on Scaled Quail.

An important part of the scholarship requires the recipient to present their results at a regular MVAS meeting. This allows our members to share in some of the latest research in natural resource conservation. This year's winner will present on April 16 (see Program announcements on page 2).

*Caballo CBC.* In contrast to the Las Cruces CBC, the thirteen participants in this count on December 28 were treated to sunny, calm conditions. A total of 117 species were tallied, which is on the low side (in recent years, the Caballo CBC total has been in the 120s and 130s consistently). No new species were added to the list for this count, but unusually high counts were recorded for Yellow-headed Blackbird (for the second year in a row), Western Sandpiper, and Canada Goose. On the flip side, unusually low counts were recorded for both Common Mergansers and Eared Grebes, diving species that normally number in the thousands on this count.

*La Luz CBC.* Twelve participants also enjoyed sunny, calm weather on this January 2<sup>nd</sup> count. A total of 88 species were observed, 8 more than last year and the second-highest species total ever tallied on this count. New for the count circle were Cackling Goose (if it gets through the regional reviewer), Peregrine Falcon, and Orange-crowned Warbler. New high counts (most individuals ever recorded on this count) were observed for Ladder-backed Woodpecker, Brown Creeper, Lesser Goldfinch, Eurasian Collared-Dove, and Rock Pigeon.
